The epigraphs: Epigraphs are quotes that preface texts. Radcliffe includes epigraphs at the beginning of the chapters from various sources, among them Shakespeare. Read the epigraphs and, after reading the chapters, consider why she chose the quotations she did. Did she choose them thematically or for connections to plot, tone, characterization?

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The poems: The novel also includes 19 poems mixed in with the story. It is tempting to skip over the poems. Resist this urge, and read the poems to identify their romantic features (see the chart).

Romantic Elements Annotation Categories:

Romantic Literature

Emphasis on Private values: Personal experience, Emotion, Dreams, Imagination, Authenticity over conformity to group values

Depictions of Free Spiritedness, solitude, sensitivity; often valorized people who defied social conventions (rebels).

Tend to valorize rural settings; depicted urban life as corrupt and destructive.

Depicted nature as inspiring almost religious feelings of awe, reverence, and fear (what the Romantics termed the "sublime"). Experiencing the sublime was a goal of the Romantics.

Sometimes depicted the lower classes, children, working professionals, and the poor with greater sympathy than Neoclassical literature.

Literary Elements Annotation Categories: Setting, Conflict, Characterization, Tone, Theme, Motif, Climax, Resolution, Irony, Foreshadowing, Flashback, Frame Narrative, Monologue/Soliloquy/Apostrophe, Point-of-View/Narrator/Free Indirect Style

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Literary Device Annotation Categories:

Structural devices: repetition, anaphora, epistrophe, catalog, chiasmus Figurative Language devices: Metaphor/Simile, Synecdoche/Metonymy, Hyperbole/Understatement, Personification, Zoomorphism, etc.
