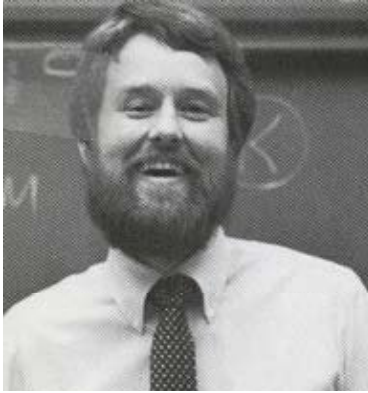

TEACHERS: THE ONE'S WHO HAVE BEEN HERE THROUGHOUT THE YEARS



Gavel: How long have you been teaching at NDA and how old were you when you started?

Mr. Greife: I have been teaching here for 34 years. I started when I was 26 years old in 1978.

G: What subjects have you taught?

Mr. G: AP Euro, Psychology, World Civ, Global Issues, US History, Geography, and European Studies.

G: What has changed the most throughout the years?

Mr. G: The building has changed. There used to be no classes on the first floor; they were all typing rooms. The old gym was the auditorium. There was over 700 students and a lot more nuns as teachers.

G: Why do you like teaching history?

Mr. G: I love the subject. There are good stories, that's what makes up history. History tells you where you come from. It's the development of life.

G: What's your favorite event in history? Why?

Mr. G: I like the period of Ancient Rome, because it reminds me a lot of America today. Maybe we can learn from their history to help with the problems we are having today. I also like the French Revolution, because it is a very complicated event in history. Lastly, I like World War II. It is the biggest war in history and has changed warfare forever.

Gavel: How many years have you taught at NDA?

Mrs. Greife: I have been teaching here for 39 years.

G: Where did you attend high school?
