1. Explain what the motivations of the Spanish, French, and Dutch colonization were and the consequences of these motivations for settlement patterns and colonizing methods. (1.4, 1.5, 2.2) (LO 1-2)

Describe the economic basis, type of founding contract, political / legal form of governance, and motivational differences between the Jamestown, Plymouth and Massachusetts Bay, Carolinas, and the Middle Colonies, using key terms whenever possible.
